COMMON PRONUNCIATION MISTAKES

"Ed" at the end of regular verbs in the past tense is pronounced in 3 different ways:

- /Id/
- /t/
- /d/

/i:/ /ə/ /ð/

/ld/ (id) - Regular verbs that end in /d/ or /d/ end in an /ld/ sound.

- Need → needed /Id/
- End \rightarrow ended /Id/
- Start → started
- Want → wanted /Id/

Tip: /Id/ sounds like "did"

WHERE CAN I FIND THE PHONETIC TRANSCRIPTION OF WORDS?

/t/ - Regular verbs that end in an unvoiced consonant sound.

- Unvoiced sounds: no vibration in the throat. We are not using our vocal chords.
- Unvoiced consonants sounds include (sounds not the letter):

/f/ /k/ /p/ /s/ /t/ (sh) and (ch) sounds

```
/f/ Laugh → laughed
/k/ Like \rightarrow liked
/p/ Stop \rightarrow stopped
/s/ Miss \rightarrow missed
(sh) Wash→ washed
(ch) Watch→ watched
```

*/t/ Ask → Asked

/d/ - Regular verbs that end in a voiced consonant sound.

- Voiced sounds: voiced means that we are using our vocal chords, we are making a sound.
- Voiced consonants sounds include (sounds not the letter):

/b/ /g/ /v/ /z/ /m/ /n/ /l/ /th/ /r/ sounds

Some examples:

```
/b/ Grab → grabbed
/g/ Beg → begged
/v/ Use → used
/n/ Listen → listened
/l/ Kill → killed
```

EXAMPLES OF WORDS IN ENGLISH WITH SILENT LETTERS AT THE BEGINNING OF THE WORD

WORDS BEGINNING WITH A SILENT LETTER "H"

- Hour
- Honour
- Honest
- Heir
- Herbs (US)

WORDS BEGINNING WITH A SILENT LETTER "P"

- Psychology
- Psychiatrist
- Pseudo
- Pneumonia
- Pneumatics

INITIAL-STRESS-DERIVED NOUNS

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The pronunciation changes when the stress of a verb moves to the first syllable in the word when it becomes a noun or adjective.

The explanation can be confusing, let's look at some examples:

Record (v): "I must remember to record my TV show."

Record (n): "The American swimmer has broken many world records"

Export (v): "companies export many goods."

Export (n): "the **ex**port of weapons is prohibited." (BrEng)

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
